

How Can I Help at Home? Reading - Paired Reading

We know that regular reading at home can make a big impact on your children's ability to read and access harder texts as they get older. Paired reading encourages children to read more independently and become more positive about reading. Sessions should be fun and relaxed and it doesn't have to just include the children's books from school, you can use a range of texts including magazines, newspapers, non-fiction books and comics.

How do I do paired reading?

- Sit side by side with your child so that you can read together. If it is a new reading material, begin by talking about the front cover, the illustrations and what they already know about the subject.
- Start by reading together at the same pace, trying to follow your child's speed.
- Encourage the child/ young person to point to each word as they read. If a mistake is made, give the child/young person about 4 seconds to self-correct. If this does not happen, read the word for them and ask them to repeat it.
- Continue reading and use praise consistently. They can indicate when they would like to continue reading alone by using a signal such as a tap on your arm or a knock on the table. Praise them for their effort and willingness to read alone.
- If your child is reading alone and makes a mistake, give them 4 seconds to self-correct the word and allow them to continue reading alone. If they are stuck on the word, then say the word for them and ask them to repeat it. At this point, you go back to reading together until your child signals that they would like to read alone.
- Try not to go any longer than 15 minutes and make sure that you give them plenty of praise.
- Don't get your child to break up a word that they don't know, so that they build fluency and confidence.
- The other important thing is to minimise distractions, so try and read in a quiet place away from the TV or the rest of the family. Give it a try and see how you get on.

Q. My child keeps getting the same book and they have already read it once? We often have parents asking for a new book only a day after the book went home. It's great that the children are reading but there is a real benefit in children re-reading and practising a book multiple times. To begin with, having exposure to the words multiple times means that the children are more likely to remember them, improving their sight reading. It's also essential that children learn stories – do you remember your favourite nursery rhymes or books that you read over and over again? Learning these patterns is a vital aspect of storytelling, speech, language and writing as the children get older. They do this through repetition, practice and exposure to books more than once. If you find that a book hasn't been changed for a few days, please read it again with your child and don't worry too much. There is a method behind it.
